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## INTRODUCTION

Mount Juliet, a thriving suburb east of Nashville, is a family-oriented place that is home to more than 35,000 residents and within a day's drive to more than half of the American population. Mount Juliet is located in Wilson County, one of the state's top five most affluent counties and fastest growing counties in the state. As Mount Juliet continues to grow, keeping up with recreational needs is essential for this booming community to provide the quality of life our residents are looking for.

This is the City's first Systemwide Parks and Recreation Master Plan and provides a framework for guiding the City through management and operations of parks and recreation as well as outline current recreational facilities and amenities in order to recommend achievable strategies for providing the City's future growth with additional park facilities and programming.








## **DEMOGRAPHICS**

#### POPULATION TRENDS AND PROJECTIONS

In 2018, the United States Census Bureau projected Wilson County, which includes Mount Juliet, the fastest growing county in the State of Tennessee.





## POPULATION PERCENT CHANGE IN MOUNT JULIET

Between 2015-2018, the City of Mount Juliet added a new resident every 8.5 hours. The following charts show the percentage of growth year-over-year. In total, Mount Juliet's population has increased 44% in the last 10 years.

## **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

Quality community engagement is a cornerstone of any successful planning process. The Mount Juliet Systemwide Parks and Recreation Master Plan is a roadmap for the future of Mount Juliet's parks and recreation system, and the guidance and feedback provided by meaningful public participation is essential for the plan to accurately reflect the needs and desires of the community. To gain a broader understanding of those needs and desires, input was gathered from City staff, community stakeholders, and members of the general public through a variety of activities that included a strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and challenges exercise, online survey, and staff and stakeholder interviews.









#### SWOC ANALYSIS

The City engaged key stakeholders for a SWOC (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Challenges) evaluation. This stakeholder group included the City's Parks Board, Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC), Board of Commissioners (BOC), and several key Community Center attendees. Several strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and challenges were identified by project stakeholders:

- Leaning on a Dedicated Staff
- Desire for Fitness Related Amenities

#### **WEAKNESSES**

- Need for Additional Sport Facilities (ie. Not Enough Pickleball Courts, No Gym, etc.)
- No Public Pool & Minimal Water Features
- Need Additional Lighting
- Indoor Facilities Need Cleaning
- Not Enough Funding
- Lack of Identification (ie. Confusion on what is Public vs. Private such as Greenway System, Minimal Park Signage, Lack of Future Parks & Recreation Vision, etc.)

## PUBLIC SURVEY

Community input is a vital part of the needs assessment process because the City's parks and recreation opportunities are meant to serve the people. There is no better way to gain an understanding of the current state of the system and what needs are or are not being met than by listening to the people who use the parks on a daily basis.

#### METHODOLOGY

One of the key strategies for public input used by the project team was a public survey used to gather feedback from the community. The 18 questions in the survey were developed to gather data regarding perceptions, programming, and usage trends across the community's parks and recreational facilities. Mount Juliet promoted awareness and participation for the survey through social media, specifically the Mt. Juliet Park's Facebook page and the Mt. Juliet Facebook page. The City also sent out the survey through the Alert App, to all residents who are registered with the app. The online survey utilized Survey Monkey and was live between February 26,2021 and March 26, 2021.

#### MAJOR FINDINGS

The results summarized in the exhibits on the following pages reflect the feedback provided by the 278 participants that completed the survey. The input they gave provided critical insights that were used to help the City begin prioritizing future investments and improvements.





#### SURVEY QUESTIONS

The online survey had a total of 18 guestions which could be broadly grouped into 5 categories:

#### DEMOGRAPHIC QUESTIONS

- Which best describes your place of residence?
- Provide the number of people in each age group present in your household.
- What ethnicity/race is represented in your household?

## FACILITY AND AMENITY PERCEPTION QUESTIONS

- What attracts you to the parks and/or recreation facilities?
- What are the strengths of Mount Juliet Parks and Recreation that we need to build on for this master plan?
- What are the weaknesses of Mount Juliet Parks and Recreation that we need to suggest to improve in this master plan?
- On a scale of 1 to 10 with 10 being superior, how would you rate the City's Parks and Recreation System?
- Where should the City focus its resources to improving the City's Parks and Recreation System?
- Does the City's Parks and Recreation System have operational or maintenance issues that need to be addressed and improved upon?




## WHAT BEST DESCRIBES YOU?

Survey participants were asked about their place of residence so that the distribution of survey participants could be compared to the distribution of the City and County's overall population. As shown in the figure, 91% of survey participants were residents of Mount Juliet, with 8% residing in the greater Wilson County. 1% of respondents cited they live in Lake Providence area or were seasonal residents.



## WHAT ETHNICITY/RACE IS REPRESENTED IN YOUR HOUSEHOLD?


Survey respondents and those in their households are 81% White, 4% Hispanic or Latino, 3% Black or African American, 3% Asian and 1% Native American or Alaska Native. Less that 1% of the respondents identify as Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander. 8% of respondents preferred not to answer.






## PROVIDE THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE IN EACH AGE GROUP PRESENT IN YOUR HOUSEHOLD

Survey participants were asked about the age makeup of their household, with the figure below showing the age distribution of 943 total people. 35-50 years old make up the largest age group with 28%, followed by 51-64 years of age with 16% and 0-5 years of age with 14% of the total. The age ranges of 6-12 years and 65+ each make up 12% of the distribution, followed by 25-24 years of age making up 8%, 13-18 years of age at 6% and the remaining 4% belonging to those 19-24 years of age. The figure below highlights that many families in Mount Juliet have young children ages 0-12 years old. This correlates with Mount Juliet census data, which shows a large percentage of young children and adults between ages 35-50.



## HOW DO YOU LEARN ABOUT COMMUNITY EVENTS?


The 278 survey participants were asked to share how they learn about community events. Because respondents were able to select more than one option, the figure below shows their 578 responses. The data shows that 81% of respondents learn about events through social media. The next most popular response was word of mouth, with 57% of respondents using this method. Besides these two most common responses, 14% of participants responded "other", with most citing the use of the app "Nextdoor" to stay up-to-date on community events. Least utilized methods included radio/television and flyers/posters. Because not everyone is connected through word of mouth, it is recommended that Mount Juliet put additional effort into marketing facilities and events through online and print media. Recommendations include running several different social media accounts and replacing the information sign that used to be on the corner of Mount Juliet Road and Charlie Daniels Park.






## HOW OFTEN DOES YOUR HOUSEHOLD VISIT THE MOUNT JULIET PARKS?

Survey respondents overwhelmingly visit Charlie Daniels Park over other park facilities. Mundy Park and Mount Juliet Bark Park are the next most visited facilities. The majority of people said they were not familiar with Eagle Park, Ethan Page Park, Jones Family Park, Robinson Park and Town Center Trail. Increasing awareness of current park facilities could relieve overcrowding at Charlie Daniels Park and encourage patrons to utilize other green spaces around town.



## WHICH PROGRAMS AND EVENTS DOES YOUR HOUSEHOLD UTILIZE?


This question asked survey respondents to identify the programs and events they use, with the figure below showing the breakdown of responses for each offering. Special events (57%) received the highest number of responses, followed by athletics (46%), exercise classes (14%), group classes (8%), senior activities (9%) and new mom's group (5%). A significant number of responses cited being not familiar with the City's offerings. This indicates an opportunity for the City to better market its programs and events to the public to increase participation.






## WHICH FACILITIES AND AMENITIES DOES YOUR HOUSEHOLD UTILIZE?

When participants were asked which facilities and amenities their household utilizes, greenways (78%), open green space (67%), playgrounds (65%) and splash pad (45%) received the most responses. The least utilized facilities in the community include the sand volleyball courts (22%), pickleball courts (16%) and the skate park (13%). These responses show that more respondents are using the more generic recreation facilities like greenways and playgrounds versus fewer are using the more specialized recreation facilities like volleyball and pickleball courts, which is not surprising. In contrast to the previous question, fewer respondents answered "not familiar" with the current facilities or amenities, which means the City may be doing a better job at marketing these facilities, than other programs or events.



## WHAT TYPE OF ATHLETIC FACILITIES AND PROGRAMMING DOES YOUR HOUSEHOLD UTILIZE?

This question asked participants to identify which City's facilities and program offerings they utilize, with the most popular responses being running (43%) and biking (38%). This answer coincides with other survey responses requesting more trail connectivity and maintenance. 29% of respondents said they use the basketball facilities, while another 29% said they do not utilize any programming listed. The remaining responses were athletic offerings including: soccer (27%), baseball (19%), disc golf (16%), football (13%) softball (9%), and skateboarding (5%).



## WHAT COULD THE CITY DO TO INCREASE THE NUMBER OF TIMES YOU VISIT A MOUNT JULIET PARK OR FACILITY?


Survey results found that increasing overall connectivity, through the strategic construction of greenways, sidewalks or other pedestrian connections, is the number 1 thing the City could do to increase the frequency of visits to the parks and recreational facilities (50%). This was followed closely by increasing the public knowledge of the parks (48%), providing facilities of interest (46%), locating public parks closer to their residence (46%), increasing the maintenance and upkeep of facilities (20%), and adjusting program hours (8%). 16% of survey respondents chose "other", sharing that they would like to see more diverse programming options, a community pool and more parks on the south side of town.

## WHAT ATTRACTS YOU TO THE PARKS AND/OR RECREATION FACILITIES?

Survey respondents cited a wide variety of elements that attracted them to the parks and recreation facilities. As shown in the figure below, walking/ running (82%), nature (76%) and playgrounds (56%) were the most frequently cited reasons, Half of the respondents said public events attracted them to use the City's facilities. The least frequently referenced attractions were team sports (31%), indoor programs (20%), and private events (19%). For those that selected "other", tennis, concerts and a community pool would attract them to Mount Juliet's parks and recreation facilities.

## WHICH ACTIVITIES/PROGRAMS/EVENTS WOULD YOU LIKE MOUNT JULIET TO ADD?

When asked what activities, programs or events residents would like to be added, youth sports, tennis courts and a community pool received the largest number of responses. Those surveyed also requested more trails for hiking, biking and walking, as well as indoor programming and a sports complex. There were also requests for more diverse programming options for people of all ages like arts and cultural events.





## WHAT TYPE OF FACILITIES WOULD YOU LIKE MOUNT JULIET TO ADD OR EXPAND?


Respondents identified the type of facilities they would like to see added or expanded upon, and an overwhelming response for a community pool is illustrated in the word cloud below, along with more tennis courts, parks, and playgrounds. Accessibility to parks through trail creation and expansion was another frequent response by those surveyed.





## WHAT TYPE OF ATHLETIC FACILITIES/PROGRAMMING WOULD YOUR HOUSEHOLD UTILIZE, IF IT WERE AVAILABLE?

Respondents identified swimming (62%), track (34%) and soccer (30%) as the types of athletic facilities/programming they would utilize if it were available. This correlates with other survey responses indicating a high interest level in building a pool for the Mount Juliet community. 23% of respondents cited they would not use any of the athletic facilities listed if they were available, which could indicate they participate in less programmed athletic activities, and prefer hiking, biking or walking options. Football (13%) and lacrosse (9%) received the least number of responses.

## WHAT ARE THE STRENGTHS OF MOUNT JULIET PARKS AND RECREATION THAT WE NEED TO BUILD ON FOR THIS MASTER PLAN?

Respondents identified several strengths of the parks and recreation system in the City of Mount Juliet, including the cleanliness, accessibility, great staff and overall safety of the community. Many people cited they would like to see more parks on the south side of town and that access to parks in some neighborhoods is limited. Other descriptors frequently mentioned were trails, variety of programming options and adding more off-leash dog areas. The word cloud below illustrated the strengths of the City's facilities.





## WHAT ARE THE WEAKNESSES OF MOUNT JULIET PARKS AND RECREATION THAT WE NEED TO SUGGEST TO IMPROVE ON IN THIS MASTER PLAN?

Survey respondents identified several weakness of the parks and recreation system in Mount Juliet including the need to increase program diversity, lack of indoor recreation facilities, lack of communication with the public, and lack of facility accessibility. Many respondents highlighted they would like to see a Charlie Daniels style park replicated on the south side of town to serve those residents, as well as more indoor programming options like a pool or playground to serve the community during winter months.




## ON A SCALE OF 1 TO 10 WITH 10 BEING SUPERIOR, HOW WOULD YOU RATE THE CITY'S PARKS AND RECREATION SYSTEM?

When asked to rate the City's parks system on a scale of **1 to 10**, the median rating was **6 out of 10**, suggesting that most respondents feel the parks system is adequate with areas that could be improved.



# DOES THE CITY'S PARKS AND RECREATION SYSTEM HAVE OPERATIONAL OR MAINTENANCE ISSUES THAT NEED TO BE ADDRESSED AND IMPROVED UPON?

82% of survey respondents shared the City's Parks and Recreation System does not have maintenance issues. The remaining 18% of those surveyed said there were maintenance issues that need to be addressed. Additional comments expanded upon the need for better maintenance of the public restroom, park facilities and trails.





## WHERE SHOULD THE CITY FOCUS ITS RESOURCES TO IMPROVING THE CITY'S PARKS AND RECREATION SYSTEM?

When asked where should the City of Mount Juliet focus its resources to improve the City's Parks and Recreation System, the majority of the respondents said a community pool, increasing youth sports offerings, and adding more tennis courts should receive the most resources. Additional responses cited increasing the number of trails (biking, walking and hiking) around town to connect people to the City's greenspaces, as well as increasing program diversity for people of all ages. The word cloud below illustrates the responses by those surveyed.



## RECREATION INVENTORY AND ANALYSIS

#### EXISTING FACILITY EVALUATION

In order to understand what the City is currently providing, the consultant team worked with Department staff to document existing conditions and identify amenities. Existing facility evaluations were prepared for the following locations:

- Charlie Daniels Park
- Eagle Park
- Ethan Page Park
- Hamilton-Denson Park
- Jones Family Park
- Mount Juliet Bark Park
- Mundy Park
- Robinson Park
- Tomlinson Property Park

Each facility evaluation consisted of acreage, amenities, and conditions of amenities. The condition of each amenity was noted as either good, fair or poor. Short and long-term recommendations for each facility are made based on these evaluations.







Goals are set in order to align the existing programming and facilities with potential improvements and growth of the Parks Department. There is a new energy within the Department coinciding with recent purchases of new park land, including the Hamilton-Denson and Tomlinson properties. The current elected officials understand the importance for recreation of all ages in the community and continue to show support of the youth sports leagues providing opportunities for children by setting goals that cater to families.



The following goals will seek to accomplish this and support this effort. For Mount Juliet, the goals are first divided into those for each existing park facility and those dedicated toward staff and programming. For each group, there are potential short-term, mid-term, and long-term goals. The time period covered by each category is to be defined by the City.



## **NEW FACILITY GOALS**

Future parks and recreation facilities are recommended for Mount Juliet based on NRPA averages and the anticipated growth in the community. These new facilities will provide a high level of service with new recreation opportunities for the City's residents as well as expand upon the current offerings. The following chart compares the number of existing amenities that Mount Juliet has compared to the number they should have based on average community data from the NRPA Performance Review Report. Recommendations for additional facilities in Mount Juliet are listed based on this data.

## CONCLUSION

The purpose of this Master Plan is to provide a comprehensive understanding of the community's existing assets and programming and provide guidelines for future investments in those assets. By developing this plan, the City has recognized the need to make key investments to support existing facilities and increase park amenities to better serve the wants and needs of its citizens.

This plan provides recommendations for how and where to focus these investments, which will allow the City to strategically expand and improve its parks and recreation system. This expansion holds the potential to materially enhance the quality of life for Mount Juliet's citizens, making the City a more active, attractive, and livable community for all people.
